INTRODUCTION

Regional cooperation can significantly influence not only the achievement of the UN Sustainable Development Goals by countries, but also the effectiveness of the implementation of national development programs and strategies. In recent years, an international community and the countries of Central Asia have paid particular attention to supporting regional cooperation in addressing environmental and sustainable development issues. In the process of strengthening regional cooperation, building the capacity of a new generation of regional leaders is one of the important factors in the prosperity of the region.

Examples of successful and effective regional initiatives and dialogue platforms are the “Environment for Central Asia” process, as a framework for regional cooperation, the Central Asian International Environmental Forum (CAIEF), the Central Asian Climate Change Conference (CACCC), and the Central Asian Leadership Programme on Environment for Sustainable Development (CALP).

Today in the region, more than ever increasing the role of new generation managers, regional leaders with global thinking, regional vision, understanding of the importance of regional cooperation, ready for innovation, having the skills and competencies to jointly respond to global challenges and solve regional issues on water, climate change and other environmental and sustainable development issues.

It is noteworthy that the CALP, being a flagship initiative of CAREC, currently is the only regular programme to improve environmental capacity for sustainable development in Central Asia for government, academic, private sectors and NGO representatives, which helps to ensure a comprehensive understanding of environmental issues and sustainable development.

the organization continues to develop its role as a facilitator of regional environmental cooperation in Central Asia, increasingly involving young people in the region and providing a neutral platform for capacity building, sharing experience, best practices and facilitating regional dialogues in various sustainable development topics.

In this context, the second CAIEF should be noted, which took place on June 5-7, 2018 in Tashkent in order to strengthen regional environmental cooperation with the participation of representatives of environmental agencies of Central Asian countries, international and regional organizations, diplomatic missions, and leading experts in the field of environmental protection and sustainable development, the youth of the region, has given new impetus to regional cooperation. The forum was organized by the Government of the Republic of Uzbekistan, the State Committee on Ecology and Environmental Protection and CAREC.

The main thematic areas of the CAIEF 2018 :



biodiversity conservation and the development of a network of protected natural areas



integrated management of solid household waste



renewable energy and energy efficiency



water cooperation

CAIEF 2018 allowed the participants to be informed about the trends in the development of the legal and institutional framework, research cooperation, and the implementation of public-private partnership on key forum topics. The forum participants discussed best practices and technologies, lessons learned, and investment opportunities. In addition, the forum allowed exploring opportunities to strengthen regional cooperation, formulate and agree on joint actions in the process of achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) for Central Asia.

In this regard, the CALP in 2018 received a new potential development in terms of its relationship with the CAIEF theme in Tashkent and strengthening the role of young leaders in the region in the “Environment for Central Asia” process.

The 9th Leadership Programme on Environment for Sustainable Development was organized and conducted from 17 to 26 September, 2018 in Almaty in the form of two modules:

September 17-23, 2018 – gathered young professionals from the state, non-governmental, academic sectors, as well as media and business at the CAREC head office



September 24-26, 2018 at the DKU – was held for civil servants from six countries of the region and focused on the legal aspects of cooperation on water resources and climate change.

The main focus of the CAIEF 2018 is reflected in the agenda of the 9th CALP:


Strengthening regional cooperation and making sustainable decisions in the field of environmental protection and sustainable development. In this regard, the selection of participants to the programme focused on increasing the capacity of public sector representatives, nominated by the state bodies of the countries of Central Asia and Afghanistan.

Therefore, in 2018, the majority of participants in the 9th CALP were representatives of ministries and agencies for environmental protection, water resources, energy, and foreign affairs, and these are the future decision makers on environmental issues in the region.



LEADERSHIP AND THE ROLE OF YOUTH IN TRANSFORMATION

According to the UN



The UN and young people

Building on its global convening role, the United Nations is uniquely placed to act as a source of protection and support for young people, and a platform through which their needs can be addressed, their voice can be amplified, and their engagement can be advanced. The UN recognizes young people as rights-holders, and promotes and facilitates transparency, accountability, and responsiveness from governments, international organizations and others toward young people.

The UN Secretary-General's Envoy on Youth

Ms. Jayathma Wickramanayake was appointed United Nations Secretary-General's Envoy on Youth in June 2017. As a global advocate for youth, she works to ensure the participation of young people in issues that matter to them, giving them a voice at the UN and around the world. Championing the SDGs, she also brings the work of the UN closer to young people around the world.

Young SDG leaders

In September 2016, the inaugural class of 17 Young Leaders was announced. Coming from different backgrounds, sectors and regions, Young Leaders are selected based on their efforts to end poverty, combat climate change and reduce inequalities. They work with the Envoy on Youth to engage young people in the SDG, advocate for their achievement and contribute to a brain trust supporting the UN's advocacy efforts to mobilize young people. They also offer their ideas for promoting the Agenda among young people.

On January 30-31, 2018, the UN Youth Forum was held at the UN headquarters in New York

Speaking to the participants, Mr. M. Lajčák, Chairman of the 72nd session of the UN General Assembly, stated that it is impossible to solve modern challenges and

threats without the active participation of the younger generation, who "possesses innovative approaches". According to him, it is necessary to equip young people with modern skills, to encourage their initiatives. At the same time, the chairman of the 72nd session of the General Assembly stressed that the issue of decent employment of this category of the population will remain one of the priorities of the UN.

In 2015, the Global Program of Action (GAP) on ESD was adopted by UNESCO and the world community.

5 priority action areas



To enable strategic focus and foster stakeholder commitment, the Global Action Programme (GAP) on Education for Sustainable Development (ESD) has identified five priority action areas to advance the ESD agenda.

Priority Action Area 4:

Empowering and mobilizing youth.

Young people have the potential and motivation to drive the sustainable development movement and young activists and leaders, are both beneficiaries and drivers of this action area. Today more than one billion people fall within the age bracket 18 to 35, the largest group ever to make the transition to adulthood.

Youth are also an important consumer group and the habits they develop now will have a major impact on future consumption patterns.



CALP AS A TOOL FOR LEADERSHIP AND CAPACITY BUILDING IN THE CENTRAL ASIAN REGION

Working with young people is a priority area of public policy for many countries in Central Asia.

Thus, during the 72nd session of the UN General Assembly in September 2017, President of Uzbekistan Shavkat Mirziyoyev put forward initiatives to:

- ✓ develop multilateral cooperation in the field of social support for the younger generation
- ✓ protecting their rights, freedom and legitimate interests

A proposal was announced for development of the UN International Convention on the Rights of Youth

aimed at the formation and effective implementation of youth policy in the context of globalization and the rapid development of information and communication technologies.

In the Message of the President of Kazakhstan from October 5, 2018, it was proposed to create a broad platform of social elevators, which will include a full range of measures to support all categories of youth and declare

Thus, the CA Leadership Programme responds to global, regional and national challenges, giving more opportunities to young people in the Central Asian region to participate in the environmental protection process and influence the promotion of knowledge and values of sustainable lifestyles in society and on the level of decision-makers.

It is known that the CA Leadership Program is based on the achievements and lessons of the CAREC Young Leaders Program (2006-2008, the EU and the Government of the Netherlands), and the UNEP Leadership Program at the Tongji University, China, and is **one of the most successful examples of a multi-partner, intersectoral, inter-agency initiatives** to build the capacity of young people in the EECCA region and the Asia-Pacific region.

Taking into account the global and regional challenges in the field of environment, water resources and sustainable development in Central Asia:

- The need to develop a regional dialogue for a faster response to global challenges;
- The need to introduce innovative approaches and programs, update databases in the field of environmental protection, water resources, climate change and sustainable development;
- The importance of building capacity for teaching a new generation modern subjects, vocational training and retraining;
- Limited financial resources and donor sources to finance selected major educational programs in the Central Asian region;
- Lack of certified teachers and trainers to improve the skills of specialists in sustainable development;
- The fragmentation and instability of project results: low "institutional memory", replication of knowledge, and updating information, etc.

the role of the CALP, as a regular program to enhance the potential of young leaders in the region, is increasing from year to year, as evidenced by the increasing number of applications from the region's youth and nominations from national partners represented by ministries and departments of Central Asian countries.

CONTRIBUTION OF THE CALP TO DEVELOPMENT OF THE CAREC KNOWLEDGE CENTER

As noted above, in the period from 2006 to 2018, CAREC, in cooperation with partners and donors, successfully conducted three programs of young leaders in Central Asia and nine Central Asian Leadership programs on the environment for sustainable development.

region. Our graduates not only collaborate, share good experience, work together in regional meetings and forums, but also study together at foreign universities, communicate, exchange useful information, make friends and support each other.

Today, graduates of the CALP, representing state environmental agencies, civil society, business, the media and academic institutions in the field of ecology and sustainable development, make their significant contributions to promoting regional cooperation and sustainability in various sectors throughout the


One of the graduates of CALP in September 2018 was appointed Vice Minister of Environmental Affairs in Afghanistan, many of them work in CAREC's head and country offices, in environmental media, universities and NGOs, promoting the values and benefits of regional cooperation.

Chronology of Central Asian Leadership Programmes



From year to year there has been a steady quantitative and qualitative dynamics of growth and development of the CALP. If the 1st CALP was held in Astana in 2010 with the participation of 13 people, the 9th CALP consisted of 32 leaders and 2 graduates of CALP, members of the Organizing Committee of the CALP Network, 34 participants in total. To date, there are 247 graduates of the CALP throughout the region (Figure 1).

Figure 1. Network of CALP graduates, 2010-2018




It is noteworthy that participants from NGOs and the private sector prevailed in the leadership programs of the early years; recently, there has been a persistent tendency of growing interest in participation in the CALP from the state and academic sectors. More detailed quantitative information on graduates from different sectors is provided by country in Figure 2. It is important to note the active participation in CALP of representatives of international programs, projects and regional organizations.

The increase in interested graduates in the field of public service is an indicator of the demand for and recognition of the important role of the program in enhancing the potential of employees by national partners. In addition, it is an opportunity to improve legislative practices and influence the adoption of more sustainable decisions in the field of environmental protection.

The role of graduates of CALP working in various structures is to help effectively influence awareness raising, promotion of mechanisms and best practices aimed at improving the environment and sustainable development.

Figure 2. The number of graduates of the CALP in the context of sectors, 2010-2018



The number of participants from countries for the period 2010-2018 varies from 22 (Afghanistan) to 58 (Kazakhstan) people. Due to the fact that participants from Afghanistan joined the program only in 2013, the number of graduates from this country is less. The largest number of graduates is from Kazakhstan – 58 people, since many of the participants in previous CALP were from Almaty, and their participation did not require additional funding. In addition, it has become a tradition that young employees and trainees of CAREC take part in CALP, which also affected the indicators for Kazakhstan (Figure 3).

Figure 3. Number of participants in the CALP by country, 2010-2018



Promoting dialogue and cooperation between all stakeholders involved in the environmental protection process, CAREC continues to develop as a regional Knowledge Center on environmental issues in Central Asia and perceives knowledge and innovation as the main key in responding to global challenges and regional environmental needs in Central Asia.

In this context, CALP is one of the most important tools for the development of the CAREC Knowledge Center, taking into account the role and capabilities of young people in promoting innovation, best practices and modern methods, the ability of young people to change, leadership, willingness to take responsibility, and the role of young leaders in strengthening regional cooperation and partnerships in all sectors and at all levels.



In 2017, the first Organizing Committee of the CALP Alumni Network (hereinafter the CALP Organizing Committee) was formed, which included 6 graduates of previous Leadership programmes and signed a Memorandum of Cooperation with CAREC. The organizing committee of the CALP works on a rotational basis for 2 years until the autumn of 2019.

CAREC together with the CALP Organizing Committee successfully conducted the Side Event of the Youth of Central Asia at the CAIEF site in Tashkent in 2018,

where they heard the general voice of young people in the region and voiced the role of CALP as a regional programme for youth capacity building. This event made an important contribution to strengthening the dialogue between government agencies, the international

development community, academia, civil society and business structures of Central Asia, shaping the region's sustainable development strategy, strengthening the Central Asia Youth Network and partnerships within the academic network of Central Asian universities, training specialists in the field of environmental protection, water resources and sustainable development – TIAME, DKU, KazNAU, and other universities of the region.



THE CAREC LEADERSHIP PROGRAMME

programme is an effective tool for building partnerships and cooperation in Central Asia.



Being interned in a leadership program, young specialists from the region are pioneers of cooperation and partnership on environmental issues in Central Asia.

The transfer of knowledge and skills is a very important element for enhancing the potential of young specialists in environmental protection and sustainable development, and with the assistance of partners forms the sustainable status of CAREC as a leader in the field of ecological knowledge.

The participation of international, donor organizations and businesses as partners and speakers of the 9th CALP once again demonstrated the timeliness, success and relevance of the Leadership Programme, as well as the importance of combining the efforts and resources of partners in implementing projects in the Central Asian region.

OVERVIEW OF THE 9TH CALP

It is well known that only close, open and mutually beneficial cooperation between the countries of the region can contribute to the development of integrated regional strategies that promote environmentally sound water management, ecosystem restoration and adaptation to climate change in the long term. Since many environmental aspects and related problems are mainly transboundary in nature, the issues of cooperation

among the Central Asian countries can significantly affect not only the achievement of the UN SDGs, but also the effectiveness of the implementation of national development programs and strategies.

As noted at the CAIEF in Tashkent, important elements contributing to regional cooperation in Central Asia are:



promoting the interests and needs of the region in global processes – developing a common regional vision



providing a platform for sharing information, lessons learned, innovative technologies



expansion of inter-agency dialogue between ministries and departments of countries in environmental protection and sustainable development issues



establishing cooperation, forming multi-partner initiatives and expanding their scope



harmonization of environmental standards at the regional level



expanding partnerships between government agencies and the private, public and business sectors in environmental protection and sustainable development

From the very first days of work in the field of environment and sustainable development, the youth of Central Asia should absorb the spirit of regional cooperation, be focused on mutually beneficial partnership and cooperation, and jointly address cross-border issues in the region. It is this aspect that formed the basis for the

development of the program and thematic sessions of the 9th CALP, arranged in the image and likeness of the program of the Second CAIEF in Tashkent

As a result, participants from Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan and Afghanistan gained access to global, regional and national innovative knowledge and practices, were able to exchange experiences and best examples in the field of environmental protection, water management, climate change and energy efficiency, approach of the relationship between water, food, energy and ecosystems, biodiversity conservation and solid waste management.

FEATURES OF THE 9TH CALP

INNOVATION

In 2018, the 9th CALP differed in its approaches, tools, and methodology. First of all, this Leadership Programme was innovative in terms of introducing transparent online registration systems, collecting applications and remote selection of members by commission members from 6 countries in the region.

PAPER-FREE PRINCIPLES – IN ACTION!

In 2018, for the first time, a Web application for smartphones and laptops was developed and implemented. The application is hosted on the existing CALP platform - calp.carececo.org/. This made it possible to provide online access for all participants, speakers and interested parties to the materials of the 9th CALP in advance. Moreover, the application helped to avoid printing materials for participants and contribute to the saving of natural resources used for paper production. This is of fundamental importance for CAREC, as for an environmental organization. This portal - calp.carececo.org/mobile/ provided access to the materials of the 9th CALP – the program, lists of participants, speakers and their biographies in Russian and English.

PARTNERSHIP AND JOINT EFFORTS

When planning and organizing the 9th CALP, CAREC changed the format of the CALP, giving both partners and CAREC programs the moderation of thematic sessions on water cooperation, water management, relationships between water, food, energy and ecosystems, climate change, energy efficiency, The post-Paris process, and other topics with extensive involvement of partners from international organizations and programs as moderators, speakers and experts.

In order to further develop cooperation and partnership with DKU, the 9th CALP also, as in 2017, was conducted in the form of two consecutive modules:

1 MODULE

From September 17 to September 23, 2018 in the CAREC for 32 young leaders of Central Asia and Afghanistan, representing the state, non-governmental, academic and business sectors (on a competitive basis).

2 MODULE

From September 24 to September 26, 2018 – in the Kazakh-German University for 12 selected civil servants from Central Asia and Afghanistan.




Thus, in 2018, not only the contextual content and qualitative composition of participants changed, but also the competitive process and approaches in the organization, including the introduction of an online system of registration and selection of participants, the growth of nominations by the government bodies of the Central Asian countries and greater emphasis on the development of skills and competencies in the field of analytics, “green business” and innovation.

PARTICIPANTS OF THE 9TH CALP

To participate in the 9th CALP, all applicants registered online on a specially created platform – calp.carececo.org/ within 3 months from March 5 to May 31. At the same time, the CAREC country offices actively and responsibly worked with national partners in the countries of Central Asia on the issues of nominations of civil servants.

The selection of participants was carried out on the basis of the developed selection criteria by a special commission consisting of the heads of all country and project offices of CAREC, in consultation with partners from the OSCE Programme Office in Astana. Preference in the selection was given to candidates officially nominated by national partners.



A separate attention was paid to the gender issue in the presentation of the Startup Mix co-founder Alisher Yusupov:

“... in the innovations it is necessary to observe gender balance. In the West, it has long been concluded that when a technological or innovative project is done only by men, it turns out worse. When there is a woman in the team, the project is better. A woman introduces her vision, which is inaccessible to men. For example, they can look at a product from the point of view of motherhood and improve it.”

It was noted that the participation of girls, both in national teams of leaders, and in general in the CALP has a positive effect on the atmosphere in the team and makes a significant contribution to team building, which contributes to the quality of discussions, group work and interactive classes. In the future, it is recommended to keep a gender balance in the selection process, in relation to all national delegations – participants of the CALP.

THEMATIC CONTENT OF THE 9TH CALP

Opening Session



The Leadership Program was opened by the Executive Director of CAREC, Dr. Iskandar Abdullayev, who presented its goals and objectives, and also noted the special importance that is attached in the region to training leaders in the field of environment and sustainable development. Greetings were continued by Mr. Gyorgy Szabo, Ambassador, Head of the OSCE Programme Office in Astana. He said that the OSCE has already supported the CALP for the 6th time, as it is considered to be an important contribution to ensuring environmental safety in the region, especially in the light of current climatic challenges.

In 2018, the agenda of the 9th CALP included many thematic plenary sessions, discussions, group practical exercises, round tables, dialogues on substantive issues for the region, as well as a series of interactive sessions and breathing exercises in the CAREC garden. CALP participants listened to a series of lectures and were involved in practical activities from the best-

known regional and international experts on various thematic areas: biodiversity conservation, integrated water resources management, water diplomacy, climate change and solid waste management.

Innovative approaches

The programme of the 9th CALP included several innovative, practically oriented sessions.



The first session was conducted by the Department of Knowledge, Projects and Resource Management (KPRM), CAREC, and was completely devoted to the theory of leadership, including its concepts, definitions, types and examples in Central Asian countries and interactive discussions on the nature of leadership on the topic “How to become a leader?”



Co-founder of Startup Mix, Uzbekistan, Mr. Alisher Yusupov, spoke about the startup ecosystem, the innovative development of Central Asian countries, local problems and possible solutions.



“The most important thing is that the audience should be ready for innovation. Therefore, a balance of innovation, technology and education is needed. Many people purchase innovative products but cannot use them. Therefore, when financing innovation, one must properly invest in education”; “Here are some examples of sectors in

which Central Asian countries can develop: agribusiness, energy, green technology, water issues. There are a lot of questions that startups can solve. For the development of niche startups there should be a junction of technologies, IT and knowledge of scientists and specialists from different fields.”

Paid special attention to the effective formation of analytical skills and negotiating techniques. The speakers emphasized that any environmental activity is inseparable from working with information and preparing analytical documents.

It was noted that the goal of analytics is to obtain the most high-quality output information and to present it in a system view, and to the main tasks – to reconstruct the past, to evaluate the results of the analysis.

They identified the following main stages of analytical work:

-  setting goals and objectives of the analysis
-  assessment and interpretation, highlighting key aspects, the formulation of specific problems and conclusions
-  collection, selection and systematization of information
-  development of solutions, ways, suggestions and recommendations, and design

Process of “green economy”

In addition to a wide range of topics covered, the programme traditionally distinguishes its interdepartmental and intersectoral nature.

The intersectoral topics that were covered:

- solid waste management;
- role of business;
- health and the environment;
- education for sustainable development (ESD)

Particular attention in the programme of the 9th CALP was paid to the promotion of the Nexus approach in water, energy and food security both at the global level and in the Central Asian region.



Thus, the participants of the 9th CALP were given the opportunity to increase their potential and exchange experience on the best global approaches and practices, existing regional development programs and the new Nexus approach. The leaders also studied economic tools for cooperation on IWRM and environmental issues and reviewed examples of successful inter-country cooperation.

PRESENTATIONS OF LEADERS

Traditionally, the agenda of the 9th CALP included presentations by participants of the Leadership Programme, who had the opportunity to present their organizations, achievements, challenges and demonstrate experience and expertise in the field of national and local policies, environmental protection projects and sustainable development in the region, national and

local initiatives, water cooperation, waste management, biodiversity conservation, adaptation and mitigation to climate change and low carbon development. This provided an opportunity for young leaders to learn more about each other, the experience of neighboring countries, colleagues and partners and discuss the possibility of cooperation for the future.

The partners of events in Central Asia presented information on the initiatives of their international agencies, after which the leaders from Central Asia and Afghanistan were able to ask them questions about the prospects for cooperation, the environmental policy situation in the Central Asian countries etc.

COMPLETION OF THE PROGRAMME. BUILDING A SUSTAINABILITY PYRAMID

On the final day of the programme, CALP participants formulated their next steps and built a “pyramid of sustainability”. Such an interactive session has already become a tradition of the Central Asian Leadership Programme. During this exercise, each of the participants wrote down their personal professional goals – these formed the foundation of the pyramid.

The exercise was conducted by the programme facilitator Ms. Eugenia Postnova (“Akmena” NGO, Kyrgyz Republic) and was held outdoors in the CAREC garden. The goal of the exercise was to plan the steps that young leaders can take once they return to their countries after completing the training. This exercise contributed to development of the regional vision and the strengthening of the regional

cooperation of the Central Asian countries and Afghanistan, including the contribution of the CALP to CAIEF. The facilitator of the exercise demonstrated an importance of teamwork in building the “Pyramid of Sustainability” and planning further steps and actions in the field of regional cooperation for the benefit of the environment and sustainable development of the region.

- The State Committee on Ecology of Uzbekistan will support the implementation of an eco-startup based on the results of effectiveness evaluation by the Foreign Ministry, together with the State Committee on Ecology, will promote the strategy of actions for nature conservation in the international arena.
- Strengthen inter-agency cooperation (Turkmenistan).
- Apply the acquired knowledge and information in their daily work (Turkmenistan).
- Create a team of experts that work in the field of environment.
- Start wide spread information campaign in the selected districts.
- Provide volunteer training to schools, kindergarten and households.
- CALP 2018 Alumni will work to develop a platform where all the Professionals share all the content of all presentations attended by them.

**The third question of the exercise was:
“How can you help each other with the implementation of your plans at the regional level?”**

Among the participants' responses, the following were noted:

-  Provide scientific advice.
-  Publishing support.
-  Joint development of key studies.
-  Support each other – invite to events, share information.
-  Joint implementation of projects to promote the SDGs, cooperation with like-minded people.



After discussion, country representatives read each other's goals. The tasks formulated by the team formed the next level of the “pyramid”. And at the very top, the participants placed a promise to work with the whole region together. The participants agreed: regional cooperation is of great importance for the development of the region.

At the end of the exercise, the participants solemnly signed a collective agreement on the implementation of their plans.

SPEAKERS OF THE 9th CALP

In 2018, the role of partners and donors was strengthened, they were invited as moderators and speakers for whole sessions on regional water cooperation, international environmental conventions, climate change and alternative energy, biodiversity conservation and PAs, solid waste management, etc.

The speakers of the 9th CALP were the heads and leading experts of international, regional, donor organizations and recognized research centers – the World Bank, the European Union, the UN Environment, the UNECE, the IFAS ED, the IPCC, the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN), the Kazakh-German University, Ministry of Energy of the Republic of Kazakhstan, Office of the OSCE Programs in Astana, Potsdam Institute for

Climate Research, Secretariat of the Ramsar Convention, Secretariat of the UNFCCC, Training Center “Orleu”, University of Friborg, GIZ, Green Business Innovation LLC, KazWaste Association, Legacy17 Association, Stockholm International Water Institute (SIWI), UNESCO, USAID, WEECOOP, ZOI Environment Network, as well as managers and specialists of programs and projects of the CAREC.

On the final day of the 9th CALP, on September 23, the leaders made a joint excursion to an environmental settlement near Almaty, “Almarai”,



in which, within the framework of the “Straw Paradise” project, resource-saving technologies were actively introduced and pilot sites for drip irrigation, permaculture, and eco-construction were introduced and etc.

On the site of this ecological settlement, thematic trainings, interactive classes, summer camps, team building events and creative meetings of environmentalists are held. Young leaders took master classes and excursions, learned about environmentally friendly construction methods and got acquainted with a way of life in harmony with nature.

2 MODULE

In the period from September 24 to 26, 2018, a Model II was held at the Kazakh-German University for selected 12 civil servants from Central Asia and Afghanistan on the legal aspects of climate change and water cooperation.



An outcome resulted from the 9th CALP:



the potential of young leaders of the region on the issues of environment and sustainable development was increased;



young Central Asian leaders promoted regional cooperation and partnership;



the role of youth was demonstrated during the process of regional cooperation on water and water-related issues, climate change and renewable energy, biodiversity conservation and waste management;



network activities (networking) of graduates of the CALP – a number of young leaders in the CA region and Afghanistan was expanded;



A network of graduates from the CALP – young leaders of Central Asia – is ready to contribute to the implementation of new regional initiatives and projects, including the “Environment for Central Asia” process.

Recommendations on the basis of results of the 9th CALP:

- Upon completion of the 9th CALP and the Report, to conduct a broad PR-company on the basis of the results of the 9th CALP;
- Send letters of appreciation to partners and donors, moderators and speakers of the 9th CALP, along with the Report on the 9th CALP;
- Start preparing for the 10th Anniversary CALP in the autumn of 2019 with the participation of members of the CALP Alumni Network (travel – at their own expense);
- Contact national partners and donors, as well as the business community to support this initiative, as part of the Year of Youth in Kazakhstan;
- Mobilize resources for the 10th Jubilee CALP;
- Provide an opportunity for graduates of the CALP to make presentations of success stories, achievements, best practices and examples at the 10th Anniversary CALP.

RESULTS, IMPACT AND PROMOTION OF THE 9TH CALP

The 9th CA Leadership Programme in 2018 brought together leaders from Central Asia and Afghanistan and provided a neutral regional dialogue platform to discuss water cooperation, climate change, energy efficiency, biodiversity conservation, solid waste management, and the NEXUS approach.

The 9th CALP demonstrated the effectiveness of the regional “Environment for Central Asia” process and regional dialogue platforms promoted by CAREC in collaboration with international partners CAIEF, CACCC and CALP.

The leadership programme has made a significant contribution to the promotion of regional cooperation and activities of CAREC over the past 17 years as a regional knowledge center on environment and sustainable development.


Summing up the 9th CALP, it is important to note the constant growth of interest and prestige to take part in this programme from young people with active citizenship. It is an honor to participate in the CALP, having undergone a serious competitive selection, for both government officials and teachers, representatives of NGOs, business and the media.

From year to year, not only quantitative indicators grow in the CALP, but there are also qualitative changes in the thematic content and approaches to the CALP.

In 2018, about 70% of CALP participants were nominees from the state authorities of the Central Asian countries,

which testifies to the recognition of the CALP as a program that assists the central authorities of the countries in building the capacity of their employees, and this is also one of the features of this 9th CALP. In turn, Figure 5. provides a visual picture of the distribution of graduates by sector, with the ability to draw attention to the overall statistics for all the years of the leadership programme.

A record number of civil servants representing the ministries of foreign affairs, environment, water resources, energy, as well as regional organizations – EC IFAS, which is currently located in Turkmenistan, took part in the 9th CALP. This was also a challenge for the organizers of the CALP, as this task force required the

involvement of innovative approaches in its organization and a greater number of international experts as speakers of thematic sessions.

The 9th CALP drew attention to an important role of young people in promoting innovation.
