CAREC didn't stand aside and supported major regional environmental events: the second Central Asian International Environmental Forum, the Central Asian Climate Change Conference and the 9th Central Asian Leadership Programme. In addition jointly with the Tashkent Institute of Irrigation and Agricultural Mechanisation Engineers, the CAREC opened the region's first innovation centre for water resources, CAREC-TI-IAME Innovations and Scientific Research Cluster.

Taking efforts to build trust and political support for its activities, CAREC made a contribution to the practical implementation of regional strategies and plans, as well as international and regional initiatives. For example, in the outgoing year, CAREC got the functions of the Blue Peace Central Asia process secretariat and became a member of the International Coalition for Green Development on the Belt and Road Initiative.

The last months of 2018 were also intense. In cooperation with the European Union, CAREC supported the process of forming a portfolio of regional investment projects. Also, in partnership with US- AID, CAREC held the first in the region Small Basin Councils Forum of Central Asia and Afghanistan, the event was held on November 26-27 in Bishkek. The SBC Forum was able to draw the attention of the governments of the region to the importance of disseminating the principles of integrated water resources management in basin planning.

In the future year, 2019, CAREC is expecting changes in the management of the organization. Based on the progress achieved in ensuring the sustainability of the organization and new development prospects, the team looks into the future with great optimism. Ahead is scrupulous but interesting work on the organization of CAIEF-2020, CACCC, 10th CALP, SBC Forum and other regional and national events.

The first Small Basin Councils Forum of Central Asia and Afghanistan

On November 26, the first Small Basin Councils Forum of Central Asia and Afghanistan started in Bishkek. The event brought together representatives of the Small Basin Councils, relevant ministries and departments of the region, as well as international organizations and projects. The forum was held within the framework of the USAID-CAREC project Smart Waters.

«This forum is another great opportunity to share experience on successful transboundary cooperation in the field of shared water management. I hope participants will use this opportunity and share their ideas», said Gary Linden, Director of USAID Mission in Kyrgyzstan, in his opening speech.

In Central Asia, there are more than 200 small transboundary rivers, which have a number of issues that impede the efficient use of water: deterioration of infrastructure, lack of water accounting, the use of outdated technologies and other challenges. Small basin councils attract all water user groups to address these issues: civil society, farmers, producers and hydropower. CAREC, with the support of USAID and other international organizations, has been promoting the creation of Small Basin Councils (SBC) on small transboundary rivers since 2012.

CAREC enters a new stage of development: The 41st Board of Governors meeting was held in Almaty

The Board of Governors of CAREC is the main governing body of the organization. The Board consists of 13 members, it includes representatives of ministries, the business sector, international, donor and non-governmental organizations on an equal basis. For the 17 years, the members of the BG meet twice a year to discuss the achievements of CAREC and approve the key directions of the organization's development.

The latest meeting of the Board of Governors was held on December 4th at CAREC head office in Almaty. The agenda of the meeting, which was the 41st in a row, was very intense. CAREC BG approved the renewed composition of the Board, discussed the achievements of CAREC for the period 2013-2018, the election of the new CAREC Executive Director and other issues.

According to the Charter, the Executive Director of CAREC is selected through an open competition for a period of three years, with the possibility of renewal for a second term, but not more than two consecutive terms. The current Executive Director, Dr Iskandar Abdullaev, began his duties in 2013. In March of the next year, the authority of Dr Abdullaev will be completed, and the members of the BG will have to elect a new Executive Director.

During the meeting, Dr Abdullaev presented the results of work for six years. Iskandar Abdullaev noted that CAREC became the leading regional centre of knowledge in the field of environment and sustainable development, the centre is recognized by national, regional and international partners.

In the period from 2013 to 2018, CAREC created a number of dialogue platforms with the aim of expanding cooperation on various environmental issues: the Central Asian International Environmental Forum, Central Asian Climate Change Conference, the Meeting of Parliamentarians and Ministry of Foreign Affairs Representatives. "Despite the existing problems, thanks to a sustainable competitive advantage, CAREC has great potential to launch new projects, thematic areas and create new connections to ensure a sustainable future for the region," said Dr Abdullaev.


